'We carry books on a variety of topics," Okray said. "We carry novels, we carry children's books, we carry cookbooks, textbooks, DVDs, books on tape and even VHS tapes.'

The cost can't be beat, Okray said. The hardcover books go for \$2, trade paperbacks go for \$1, fiction paperbacks go for 50 cents, Harlequin romances 25 cents, children's books 25 cents, VHS tapes \$1, talking books \$1 and DVDs \$1.

'That's quite a bargain," Okray said. "We will have people stop by our store at 5959 Beebe off of Mound Road and drop off a bag full of books as a donation, but they'll look around and end up buying two bags worth of books before they leave.'
