Manufacturing Jobs Returning To U.S., According to Alongi

UHY LLP, a worldwide certified accounting firm with offices in Sterling Heights and Farmington Hills, held a discussion on manufacturing in the U.S. for 2013 and the news was generally good.

The discussion held at the firm's Farmington Hills site earlier this month, was titled, "Manufacturing Outlook 2013: An American Renaissance."

Thomas Alongi, partner and national manufacturing leader for UHY LLP, said that despite what many people think about the U.S. transitioning away from a manufacturing-based economy and becoming a service economy, manufacturing still plays a huge role in our nation's prosperity.

He noted that 86 percent of the country's exports are generated by manufacturing and that every manufacturing job supports 2.9 other jobs. Alongi said 72 percent of research and development spending goes toward manufacturing and 63 percent of domestic scientists and engineers are supported by manufacturing as well.

"Manufacturing is vital to the long-term security of the country," Alongi said.

The good news for manufacturers is the relatively new trend of building where you sell, Alongi said. That means manufacturing jobs are returning to the United States. Companies like Caterpillar, GE, NCR and Coleman are returning manufacturing back to the U.S.

"It's not just one industry that is doing this," Alongi said. "And that's a good sign."

There is an abundance of factors that influence this movement, Alongi said. Currency is one factor, but there has also been a rise in the costs of the global supply chain. Transportation costs are up. He said shipping costs have risen 71 percent in four years and the cost of electricity in China has risen 15 percent since 2010.

The developing foreign markets of Brazil, Russia, India and China (BRIC) have seen a great deal of growth, but this growth has resulted in higher labor costs there, which in turn has led to a higher standard of living.

As a result, American companies, as well as others, have become more strategic in their manufacturing planning. The result is the "build where you sell" movement. Car production in China is aimed at the Chinese market and not so much to export those vehicles to North America.
