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Macomb County's Economic Growth Predicted to be Better Than U.S. CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

Jacobs cited the impact of Superstorm Sandy and depressed consumer sentiment for a less jolly holiday season, which resulted in less economic growth than expected.

Going forward, the national economy faces several hurdles, including extremely slow growth, lower wages, and Jacobs explained this lack of wage gains coupled with the restoration of some tax rates will result in lower consumer demand. Also, the current political climate tends to produce "mini settlements" rather than solutions and policies that result in a significant boost to the economy and cut down on the nation's long-term debt.

Major trading partners also affect the national economic climate, with Europe entering a period of recession, and the economic boom in China slowing. For the year 2013, Jacobs said the county can expect continued positive income growth. Meanwhile, the national picture is less rosy – a GDP growth of 1.8 to 2.0 percent through most of the year at best, but with inflation remaining low and job growth continuing.

On a positive note, Jacobs said the national housing recovery will help the local economy, as well as the continuing recovery from Sandy. Unfortunately, the recession in Europe and the uncertainty in the Chinese economy will result in a drag on expansion for the national economy, and the lack of wage gains for most workers and the restoration of past higher tax rates is expected to put a damper on consumer demand.

For the county, there are challenges in the months and years ahead as well. Jacobs said the automotive recovery has peaked and there's a need to stress on innovation and expansion of the local economic mix. Healthcare reform will also be crucial, and he recommends a focus on wellness and growth.

Jacobs said auto sales will continue to show growth, but the total impact will depend on gains in domestic market share. Housing is also expected to grow, but with prices remaining much lower. Finally, the Metro Detroit area will see increasing business opportunities, but he expects risk factors and margins to be greater.
