Pomona NHRA Meet Fires Up Season

The exciting roar of 10,000 maximum-horsepower engines, the ground-shaking vibrations of huge racing slicks biting the asphalt, exhaust explosions whipping the air and pushing the air past your body and slapping you as it rushes by, and the sweet aroma of nitro fumes will soon be back to enliven racing fans' weekends for the next 10 months. Hallelujah, racers, I'm ready.

The National Hot Rod Association has 24 meets for the 2013 season that starts and ends in Pomona. Calif.. with races usually every two weeks all across the United States. So click your belts, get a big cold Gatorade and get set for two dozen weekends that will keep you on the edge of your seat with heart racing and right foot stomping the carpet.

Each Sunday's competition was a blood rush. Imagine yourself buckled in the driver's seat, looking out the helmet at the next 1.000 feet you will travel, feeling the frame shake from even the idle speed of this monster engine, now the countdown on the lights and suddenly you are off the starting line with maximum horsepower hurling you toward the end of the strip, tripping the lights to record your run. Question: Did you even breathe on the less-than-foursecond run? Okay, the bare bones feeling of massive acceleration will be with you for some time. Now you can relax, inhale the sweet smell and taste of that 90 percent nitro fuel charge. Okav. race number one is in the record books. What's left is a feeling of "been there - done that." And maybe some broken pieces of engine, blower or whatever.

Two years ago, E.J. Potter's Bloody Mary #2 Chevy-powered Harley was there, built in the early 1960s, and now owned by Clyde Hensley of Plymouth, Mich. On the sheet metal on the left side, I read, "Jackson Hot Rod Shop." I met E.J. in 1958-59 at March 23 & 24 at Pomona, Calif. Ubly Drag Way near Stanton, at the Fairplex.

As the warm Pacific breezes hit Mich. He was just 16 years old and this was his maiden run. He only went 77 mph. We got his car under a shade tree and waved our magic wrenches and got him up to 111. E.J. at the time might have weighed 115 pounds.

Very soon, he showed up at my Jackson Hot Rod Shop and asked if I would build him an engine. Two engines later, he was covering the U.S., England, and other parts of the world, thrilling and scaring the daylights out of promoters and spectators alike. He (in his words) fell off at 127 mph at Onondaga. If you can put your hands on his book, "The Michigan Madman," on page 38 you can see the slight damage to the bike in the box of my 1955 Ford pickup.

When I had Art Afrons at Onondaga, I introduced E.J. to Art and that changed Potter, giving him a permanent taste for speed. With Art's mentoring, E.J. went to an Allison V12 Aircraft engine in a Dodge Dart, entering through the tailgate to drive.

Then he went to pull trucks with multiple V12 engines. E.J. was not one for a painted pretty machine. His Ugly 1 and Ugly 2 outpulled the best on the West Coast two years in a row, causing the promoters to ban him from competi-

His mechanical ability was wild but exciting. I will be writing about his early days soon. It makes for good reading and explains his need for speed.

Would like to have it return to California for this show but don't think it will be finished in time. Darn!
