# **Breakfast Was** About Women

Last week's Leadership Breakfast, co-hosted by the Auburn Hills, Troy and Rochester Regional chambers of commerce brought representatives from an eclectic mix of local businesses together to learn how to create an environment friendly to promoting women's advancement.

Held at the Marriott Centerpoint in Pontiac, the breakfast featured the presentation of research on this topic from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce's Center for Women in Business. Speakers included presidents from Dow Automotive, TTi Global and VMS365 shared insights on their own companies' practices in promoting women within their organizations.

Denise Asker from the Auburn Hills Chamber said the event was a sellout, with a final attendance count of 170 people.
