DRAG RACING RETROSPECT: Another "Need-for-Speed" Good

The owner of this 1993 Ford F-150 White Lightning, Robert (Bob) Moon of Ann Arbor, had an uncle that built him a three-speed, single-cylinder engine motor bike when he was about 10 years old.

Bob was a country boy and tore up the gravel roads near Ionia where he lived on a farm with his parents and three siblings.

At age 14, he was at Onondaga Dragway, located between Jackson and Lansing. Fascinated by Art Afrons' jet dragster, his uncle's Cadillac-powered 1932 Ford Chev Dragster, his need for speed was growing by massive leaps and lengthy bounds.

Bob mentioned it would be a real thrill to "ride" the jet on a 1/4 blast down the dragstrip. Sooo, arrangements were made to tie the body belly down on top of the jet. run ropes around the engine to secure the ride, complete with blood red jacket and helmet.

The "Voice of Drag Racing," Jon Lundberg, called Afrons to bring his jet to the starting line. As he approached, Jon hyped, loudly and very excitedly, "Some idiot is going to ride the jet, roped on top.

The spectators (and uninformed dragway employees) and racers went crazy, standing on top of their cars to witness this daredevil show.

Art positioned the jet at the starting line, revved the 45,000pound-thrust engine, tickled the afterburner control, and ZOOOM – six seconds and 175 mph with topside rider on board. Wow! Such excitement! Wild spectators and so much noise, with 5,000 spectators screaming, horns blowing, unmuffled cars jazzing their engines, and all while Jon Lundberg was keeping the hype way up there!

the pickup around to go back down the strip the wrong way.

The 14-year-old put on the red jacket and helmet, rode hanging out the passenger window waving his hat to the crowd.

The entire vehicle was lowered two-and-a-half inches for a roadhugging appeal to the eyes. It is a powerful, screaming fun vehicle to drive or ride in that catches the eye and heart of everyone, especially his old Uncle Dewey.

Visitors Can Look or Buy at the Novi Expo

Spring is here.

People are getting out their classic cars and anticipating an enjoyable season of car shows or maybe just hitting the road in their favorite ride.

Classic car buffs who are still looking for their next set of wheels will have the chance to inspect and even purchase one at the upcoming Detroit Spring Classic Car Auction.

The event will be held in The Suburban Collection Showplace in Novi on Saturday, April 27, and Sunday, April 28.

Bob Lichty, president of Class Motorcar Auctions, said about 200 vehicles will be on display and for sale. Prices will range from about \$5,000 to \$105,000.

Some of the vehicles that the public can see and bid on include a 1960 Nash Metropolitan, a 1939 Cadillac LaSalle, a 1960 Chevy Impala Sport Coupe, a 1949 Triumph 2000 Roadster, a 1988 Ferrari Mondial, a 1971 Olds 442 convertible and a 1994 Porsche Carrera.

"What's wonderful about this event is that the cars will be on the floor for people to look at," Lichty said. "Visitors don't have to bid on the cars to enjoy them."

There will be one auction lane and vehicles up for bid will be shown on large television screens that will display all the relevant information on the car.

"It's like a standard auto auction, but it will be indoors,' Lichty said.

The auctioneer is Joseph Mast, who leads auctions for Barrett-Jackson.

In addition to vehicles for sale, rare automotive memorabilia will be for sale, including neon signs, toys, models and other collectibles.

The vehicles come from various sources, Lichty said, some from estates, others from people who for whatever reason wish to sell their vehicles.

Not all are classics or collector cars. Some are on consignment from car dealers looking for new venues for selling vehicles. Most of the cars are from around Ohio and Michigan.

But that's the beauty of the Novi auction, Lichty said - there will be many vehicles being sold
