From WWII Jeeps to Ike's Limo, AOD Museum Has it All

There are car buffs who collect muscle cars and there are ones who collect sports cars or luxury cars or foreign cars or "orphan" cars from companies that no longer exist.

But the folks at the group called The Arsenal of Democracy have a more specialized niche that they collect - military vehicles from World War II on up.

John Lind, a former Marine who also spent time in both the Navy and Air Force Reserves (he said that's a long story in and of itself), founded the group in 1997.

"We're a group that provided restored military vehicles and other artifacts to schools and other institutions for educational purposes," Lind said. "We just provided WWII-era vehicles for a USO-styled dance at John Glenn High School in Westland.'

Lind said he and his fellow Arsenal of Democracy (AOD) members are in the group to promote the history of the United States and to honor and preserve the vehicles, many of which were made in Michigan.

"We're made up of three groups," Lind said. "There is the AOD Museum, AOD Motor Pool and the 704th Tank Destroyer Battalion Re-Enactment Group. All the groups are 501-3C charities. We like to educate on all aspects of our nation's democracy.'

The group maintains two restoration shops where they store and fix up the vehicles they obtain. One is in Fenton outside of Flint and the other is in Shelby Township.

AOD has about 70 members and 100 vehicles. The types of vehicles range from one of the first 20.000 Jeeps ever made to one of the Cadillac limousines used by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower while he was in Europe during WWII.

Lind said they get the vehicles in their collection from all over the country, even all over the world.

Ed Pashukich is a member of the group and his day job is appraising and restoring antique cars. He was able to obtain the Eisenhower limousine from a friend, "Bad" Jesse Austin, who wanted to liquidate his collection.

Austin owned a salvage yard in Wayne, and "was quite the collector," Pashukich said. Austin had

Warren Library To Hold D-Day Memorial Event

managed to get a hold of the 1942 Cadillac. It was originally owned by the widow of a WWI surgeon who donated it to the U.S. military early in WWII.

The car was sent to Europe and was made a part of Eisenhower's motor pool. Painted Army green and fitted with headlight covers and blackout lights, the car had a Hydramatic transmission that didn't work well in the mud and snow of unpaved European roads, so the car was replaced as Ike's primary transport vehicle.

The Eisenhower limo ended up being used as a back-up vehicle for high-ranking officials and for European Theater of Operations diversionary tactics. It eventually ended up in the hands of collector Austin, who sold it to Pashukich.

"We find the vehicles in Europe, South America," Lind said. 'You'd be surprised how many we've found in barns up North (in Michigan). We are known now, so people contact us when they have something they think we might be interested in. The history of Warren is tied into the creation of the tank."

Before the government built the first tank plant in Warren back in 1940, Lind said, the city was basically farm country. But once the tank plant was built, "it seems like 5,000 small stores and restaurants sprang up around the plant pretty much overnight.'

Much of Michigan's transportation infrastructure was built to transport the war vehicles built in places like Warren, Detroit and Flint during WWII, Lind said, adding that the history of these vehicles is the history of Michigan - and that the defense industry still plays a big role in the state's economy to this day.

AOD's next big event takes place in St. Clair Shores on the weekend of July 13-14 at the VFW Hall on Jefferson just past 11 Mile Road.

It's a special "WWII and Veterans" event where reenactors show off their gear and hold war games.

City Councilman Keith Sadowski said he looks forward to the park becoming a reality and sees it as a rejuvenating force for the historic village area. "We also envision the park as a rest station for a future city-wide network of bike paths," he said.
