## Buyers Beware! Flood-Damaged Cars Being Sold As 'Clean' Vehicles

Hundreds of thousands of flooded cars have washed up on the shores of every state in the country.

According to new research from Carfax, more than 212,000 cars that were branded as being flood-damaged by a state Department of Motor Vehicles are on U.S. roads right now.

"Our research proves that flood-damaged cars are everywhere," said Larry Gamache, communications director at Carfax.

"It's big business for professional con men to quickly clean up and resell these cars miles from where the flooding occurred.

"Consumers need to look out for flooded cars no matter where they live. They're a serious danger to anyone who unknowingly buys one."

Nearly two-thirds of these flood-damaged cars are on the road in 10 states – Texas, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Louisiana, Illinois, New York, Florida, Mississippi and Virginia. However, as the Carfax research shows, con artists are moving flood cars to any state where unknowing consumers will buy them.

Historically, about half of the cars damaged by floods get resold, some to unsuspecting buyers, Gamache said.

He pointed out that floodwater – especially salt water like from Superstorm Sandy – rots and corrodes vehicles from the inside out. scape, Shaping the Future."

"The GM Foundation shares a common goal with Leadership America in that we both strive to empower the leaders of tomorrow," said Pickard. "This conference will unite a diverse pool of stakeholders to share best practices and inspire change in Detroit communities and those across the country."

The Leadership America conference will examine collaborative solutions, including private and public partnerships that are making a difference in Detroit and cities across the U.S., Mainville said. The agenda will emphasize the growing influence and impact of women and men who are exercising bold leadership and making an economic difference.
