FCA Testing Runs Hot 'n Cold – Under One Climatic Roof

Where in North America can other industry-leading capability you go from testing the 4x4 capabilities of a 2015 Jeep Renegade Trailhawk at minus 40 degrees with snow whipping by at 100 mph, to baking a Renegade Limited just a few steps away at 130 degrees?

Answer: The Chrysler Technology Center (CTC) at the Fiat Chrysler headquarters in Auburn Hills.

Fiat Chrysler is using its new 4x4 dynamometer at Chrsyler Technology Center to bring anin house.

The existing drive cell that houses the new dyno can be chilled to 40 below zero and create wind speeds up to 100 mph, said Fiat Chrysler spokesman Beri Alexanian. Testing is done in blizzard-like conditions to evaluate, among other things, how a vehicle performs when dense snow clogs its air intakes.

Sink Hole Drew 250,000 Visitors to Corvette Museum

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. (AP) -The car-swallowing hole has been fixed but not forgotten at the National Corvette Museum in Kentucky. Yellow tape now marks the boundaries of the cavity that became a sensation and put the museum on the map. And instead of a gaping sinkhole driving tourism, now it's the vintage sports cars crunched by rocks and dirt.

Work ended recently to fill in the pit that consumed eight prized sports cars in early 2014. The repaired exhibit area has become a magnet for visitors, and the dirt-caked remains of the mangled cars are the stars.

Where the 60-foot-long, 45-footwide, 30-foot-deep sinkhole once drew gasps from visitors, now it's

The new Ford F-150 earned recognition as the winner of the third annual Altair Enlighten Award from Altair and the Center for Automotive Research (CAR) for the truck's use of lightweight materials to minimize weight.

The 2015 F-150 – with best-inclass towing, payload and EPAestimated gasoline fuel economy plus five-star top government crash test ratings for every cab configuration - is being recognized for its total weight reduction of up to 700 pounds, said Altair spokeswoman Jennifer Korail.

Ford's entry, one of 17 nominations that competed for the award, was selected as the winner for taking 700 pounds off of the Ford F-150 while improving its performance, safety, and efficiency, said Korail. She said Ford engineers took a holistic approach to weight reduction by incorporating advanced materials into the entire design of the vehicle, including the frame, body, powertrain, battery and interior features such as the seats. The weight savings help the truck tow more, haul more, accelerate quicker and stop shorter, and it contributes to fuel efficiency. "As America's truck leader, Ford is honored to be named the 2015 Altair Enlighten Award winner for the all-new Ford F-150.' said Raj Nair, group vice president, Global Product Development and chief technical officer, Ford Motor Company. "This award is recognition of our outstanding team members, who set

the remains of the worst-damaged cars that get astonished looks.

"It's just horrifying," said Corvette owner Doug Kidd, of Canton, Ohio. "Nature's a pretty big thing to deal with. They look like they went through a tornado.'

Seven of the eight cars are back on display in about the same spot where they plunged to fame. Five were too beaten up for repairs. One is fixed, another will return Sept. 3 after being repaired in Michigan and another will be restored by the museum. The eight cars carried a total value believed to exceed \$1 million.

The museum's Facebook followers now exceed 200,000, compared to about 50,000 before the sinkhole opened. On social media, photos showcasing the damaged cars outpace those of the shiny, sleek models on display,

said museum spokeswoman Katie Frassinelli.

"People just really enjoy hearing the story and like seeing the damage," she said. "I guess it's the rubberneck effect. These cars definitely appeal to a wider audience."

In the gift shop, jars of sinkhole dirt and rocks fetch \$10 apiece. Nearly 2,400 jars had sold through July. Wanda Cohen of Roswell, Georgia, had just posted a photo of a wrecked car on her Facebook page.

"It's like looking at the worst wrecks you've ever seen," Cohen said.

Runners and walkers from all over the Detroit area will be taking over the vehicle test track at Fiat Chrysler's Auburn Hills headquarters for the first ever "Taking Strides for Healthy Minds 5K Walk/Run" to benefit the Ruth Ellis Center (REC) on Saturday, Aug. 29, at 9 a.m.

Proceeds from the run will benefit REC's mental health services, operations and Family Preservation and Acceptance program, Shesterkin said. Registration in \$40 per participant and free for children age 12 and under and includes a T-shirt and race time.

It is estimated that up to 40 percent of all runaway and homeless youth in the U.S. identify as LGBTQ, Shesterkin said. Disproportionately affected. most often due to family rejection, these youth are at much greater risk of suicide, depression, substance abuse and HIV infection. This alarming statistic is the impetus behind "Taking Strides for Healthy Minds 5K Walk/Run.'

"We are incredibly proud to partner with FCA US on such an important cause," said Mark Erwin-McCormick, director of Development at the Ruth Ellis Center. "We know that family rejection due to a child's sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression puts young people at far greater risk of suicide, depression and substance abuse. Taking Strides for Healthy Minds is an opportunity to not only raise awareness, but also critical funding to support programs and services tailored to help families struggling with their child's identity.'

\$2.5 million to upgrade the existing climatic test cell, Alexanian said.

The upgraded drive cell consists of a new front dyno that can handle loads of up to 350 horsepower with a rear dyno operating up to 650 horsepower.

The cell also received a significant upgrade in ductwork and exhaust capabilities to accommodate high-output engines such as the 2016 Ram 2500's 6.7-liter Cummins High-Output Turbo Diesel with 900 lb.-ft. of torque.

"Our world-class environmental test center provides dynamic and static testing conditions to simulate the climatic environments that are experienced by customers around the our world," said John Nigro, vice president of Product Development, FCA-North America.

"With more 4x4 and all-wheeldrive (AWD) vehicles in our fleet than ever, this investment will go a long way to providing the durable cars and trucks our customers expect from us.'

FCA's Climatic Test Facilities are used to simulate and control environmental conditions, Nigro said.

The climatic cells are capable

of simulating the most frigid conditions in mid-winter to the extreme heat of the Gulf Coast countries.

Development in climatic chambers allows Fiat Chrysler to design and develop products to survive the harshest environments, Nigro said.

The extreme climate test is one of thousands performed daily at CTC. It is the auto industry's only headquarters building where a vehicle design can go from a napkin sketch to production prototype to advertising campaign and everything in between - under one roof, said Nigro.

CTC's 5.4 million square feet of floor space makes it the largest headquarters of any kind in North America, except for the Pentagon.

Among its features:

• The aerodynamics testing facility generates the highest wind speeds (160+ mph) of any domestic OEM's wind tunnel.

• Its 129 dynamometer cells run 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

• The facility has been running 24/7 since it opened in 1991.

• CTC's current employment numbers (14,000+) represent its historic peak.

Apple Showing Interest in Using a Vehicle Testing Site

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) – Adding fuel to rumors that Apple is working on designs for a car, local officials say engineers for the giant tech company recently made inquiries about a former navy base that's been converted into a testing ground for self-driving cars.

Apple, which is best known for making iPhones and Mac computers, hasn't said what kind of testing it hoped to conduct at the GoMentum Station automotive testing facility, which used to be a naval station in the San Francisco Bay Area city of Concord.

"We don't know. They haven't said what they want to test. It could be an iPhone," joked Jack Hall, program manager for connected vehicles and autonomous vehicles at GoMentum Station, which is operated by the Contra Costa Transportation Authority. The agency is promoting a portion of the former Concord Naval Weapons Station as an ideal testing facility for carmakers and tech companies working on automotive technology.

"It's got all the infrastructure

of a city," Hall said of the facility. "There are buildings, streets and intersections, but no people.'

The 5,000-acre site has 20 miles of paved roads, including overpasses, tunnels and railroad crossings, according to the agency's website, which calls it 'the largest secure test facility in the world." Another 7,600 acres

of the former navy base is now hicles" - cars that use the Interused as a shipping terminal by the U.S. Army.

GoMentum Station already has an agreement with Honda, which plans to test automated vehicle systems there. Hall said his agency hopes to partner with other companies for testing selfdriving cars and "connected venet and local networks to exchange a variety of information with other devices and vehicles.

Apple has "shown interest" in the facility but has not reached any agreement for testing there, Hall said. Company representatives have not actually visited vet, he said.

Disaster Brings People to 'Vette Museum

For museum officials, the trick is to keep the site's popularity from going in reverse now that visitors can't gawk at the sinkhole. The museum cashed in on the giant chasm with record attendance and revenue in 2014.

Last year, the museum just off the interstate drew 251,258 visitors, easily topping the 150, 462 visitors in 2013. The museum's prior record attendance was 200,900 in 1999. Through last month, attendance for 2015 was off just 2.5 percent compared to the first seven months of 2014, the museum said.

"We just want to try to do our best to make sure the decrease is as little as possible," Museum ex-

Maintaining that momentum will be challenging, said Jason Swanson, a University of Kentucky assistant professor in hos-

management pitality and tourism. Even if the sinkhole had been left open, the publicity that helped spark the attendance bump would have eventually waned, he said.

"The museum is better off since more people now know of the museum because of the sinkhole's publicity," Swanson said. "However, 10 years down the road, 2014 and 2015 will likely be seen as an anomaly.'

The museum is doing its part to keep the sinkhole etched as a curiosity.

A temporary exhibit shows the ecutive director Wendell Strode now-famous security camera

footage of the floor's collapse and cars toppling like toys into the pit. That footage has been viewed about 8.5 million times on YouTube, the museum said. The hole opened up when the museum was closed, and no one was injured.

This year's first runner-up, Korail said, is General Motors, who developed and used innovative engineering (CAE) methods to achieve a 163 pounds weight reduction on the Alpha architecture of the 2012 Cadillac ATS/CTS. 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DETROIT (AP) – Electric car maker Tesla Motors said Aug. 13 it hopes to raise around \$500 million in a stock offering that comes as it prepares to roll out its anticipated new SUV.

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Tesla will offer 2.1 million shares and expects net proceeds of \$492.6 million. Tesla could make up to \$566.5 million if the underwriters exercise their option to buy additional shares.

Tesla CEO Elon Musk intends to purchase \$20 million worth of stock. The company's shares rose 1 percent to \$240.94 in late afternoon trading.

Wall Street had been expecting the move. Asked in early August during the company's secondquarter earnings call if Tesla planned to raise capital, Musk said there might be value in doing so "as a risk reduction measure. I don't think that there's not a need to raise equity capital," Musk said. He said the company should have at least \$1 billion in cash on hand; it ended the quarter with \$1.2 billion in cash and cash equivalents.

In a note to investors, Stifel analyst James Albertine said the offering should have a minimal impact of on per-share earnings. He views Musk's intention to purchase shares and Tesla's plan to use the money for future growth as positives. Albertine has a "buy" rating and a \$400 price target on Tesla's stock.

The Palo Alto, Calif., automaker will begin shipping its third vehicle, the Model X SUV, in a few weeks. It's also investing heavily in a \$5 billion battery factory in Nevada, which will make batteries for both its cars and its Tesla Energy home battery business. The factory is set to start production in the first quarter of next year.

Tesla said it needs the cash to further development of the Model 3, a lower-cost electric car due out in 2017. The auto industry typically spends about \$1 billion developing new cars and putting them on the market.

Tesla is also rapidly expanding its network of Superchargers, which can add 170 miles to a Model S battery in 30 minutes. Tesla told shareholders this month that it now has 487 Supercharger stations globally and is opening one nearly every 24 hours. All that doesn't come cheap. Tesla obtained a credit line of up to \$750 million in June, but it spent \$359 million during the second quarter. Its cash total of \$1.2 billion was down from \$2.7 billion a year ago.

Siri Contacts 911. Saves Man Pinned **Under His Car**



WATERHILL, Tenn. (AP) - A Middle Tennessee teen is alive, thanks to Siri.

Eighteen-year-old Sam Ray says the voice recognition service on his iPhone – famously named Siri - called emergency dispatchers after his truck fell on him while he tried to make repairs.

Ray tells media outlets that a jack collapsed, pinning him under nearly 5,000 pounds of metal in a location where he couldn't be easily seen or heard. He says he was trying to get free when he heard Siri activate.

He says: "I said 'Call 911,' and that was all it said."

Rutherford County dispatcher Christina Lee says she first thought it was a mistaken pocket-dial, but then she heard his screams for help and sent crews, who rescued him.

Ray and Lee met Aug. 14 for the first time after the July 2 incident.

Study Shows Public Needs to Know More About Safety Tech

A new, one-of-its kind study from the University of Iowa found that a majority of drivers expressed uncertainty about how many potentially life-saving vehicle safety technologies work.

The survey also showed that 40 percent of drivers report that their vehicles have acted or behaved in unexpected ways, said University of Iowa spokeswoman Hayley Bruce.

The study, conducted by the University of Iowa Transportation and Vehicle Safety Research Division, examined drivers' knowledge of vehicle safety systems, as well as their understanding and use of defensive driving techniques, Bruce said. The study combined a literature review, the input of industry and academic experts in human factors research with an in-depth survey of more than 2,000 adult drivers across the United States.

The study found that a majority of respondents had heard of, been exposed to, or interacted with at least one of the nine vehicle safety features studied, but expressed uncertainty about all of the technologies.

"As technologies like rear-view cameras and lane departure warning systems advance and become more prevalent in the cars we're driving there is a tremendous need to improve consumer understanding of these critical safety features,' said Daniel McGehee, director of the Transportation and Vehicle Safety Research Division at the UI Public Policy Center.

Consumers reported they least understood adaptive cruise control (65 percent) and lane departure warning systems (36 percent), McGehee said. They were

Cops, Feds Push For Safe and Sober Labor Day

Law enforcement agencies in six surrounding Midwest states will participate in a nationwide Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign that focuses on preventing impaired and drunken driving during the Labor Day holiday weekend.

'Our goal is to curb illegal behavior and save lives," said National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) regional administrator Darin Jones. "We are joining with law enforcement partners to increase state and national messaging about the dangers of driving drunk. Coupled with increased enforcement and additional officers on the road, we aim to drastically reduce the toll of alcohol-impaired driving offenses.'

The 20-day, high-visibility campaign is a partnership that teams public safety and transportation officials in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin with NHTSA. The crackdown effort is part of a national push from Aug. 21-Sept. 7 (Labor Day) that will show zero tolerance for drunken driving. The stepped-up Labor Day effort comes as NHTSA seeks to keep motor vehicle fatalities as low as possible through what can be a very dangerous holiday on the roads. Throughout the country in 2013, there were 10,076 people killed in drunkendriving crashes, almost a third of all traffic fatalities. Thirty-eight percent of crash fatalities on Labor Day weekend that year involved drunk drivers (with blood alcohol concentrations [BACs] of .08 or higher), amounting to 161 lives lost. About 27 percent of the crash fatalities that occurred on Labor Day weekend involved drivers with BACs of .15 or higher - almost twice the illegal limit. In every state, it's illegal to drive with a BAC of .08 or higher.

To address that need, the University of Iowa recently partnered up with the National Safety Council to launch MyCar-DoesWhat, a national campaign aimed at educating automotive consumers about new safety technologies and how they work, Bruce said.

• Back-up Camera: provides a view of the area directly behind the car when the vehicle is in reverse.

• Blind Spot Monitor: alerts drivers when there may be something located in their blind spot. • Forward Collision Warning:

warns drivers when they are closing in on the vehicle ahead too quickly.

• Anti-lock Braking Systems: prevents wheels from locking up, helps avoid uncontrolled skidding and provides some steering control in slippery conditions like snow.

• Rear Cross Traffic Alert: provides an alert to the driver that traffic is approaching from the left or right when the vehicle is in reverse.

• Adaptive Cruise Control: maintains the speed set by the driver and a pre-set following distance.

• Automatic Emergency Braking Systems: automatically applies moderate to hard braking when the system detects that a collision is imminent.

• Lane Departure Warning: alerts drivers when they drift into another lane when the turn signal is not activated.

• Traction Control: Works in the background to help accelerate and prevent wheel slippage (or "over-spinning") when driving on slippery surfaces.

Poor Sales Kill Mitsubishi U.S. Production

NORMAL, Ill. (AP) – Mitsubishi Motors confirmed July 24 that it plans to stop production at its only U.S. factory and sell the plant in central Illinois that has more than 1,200 workers.

The Japanese automaker reviewed its global supply chain and decided it was necessary to end production at the plant and find a buyer, said Dan Irvin, the company's North American spokesman. The announcement came after Japanese media reported the automaker had decided to end production in the U.S. to focus on Asian markets.

Irvin said Mitsubishi's board will soon make a formal decision on what will happen to the plant in Normal, Ill., about 100 miles southwest of Chicago. Company officials hope to find a buyer that will maintain the factory's employment. The president of UAW Local 2488, Rod DeVary, said workers were told Friday that the plant will cease production on Nov. 30.

Annual production at the plant, which makes the Outlander SUV, has fallen to 64,000 vehicles from more than 200,000 in 2002. The company sold only 82,000 vehicles in the U.S. last year - less than 1 percent of the total market.

Japan's leading business newspaper, the Nikkei, reported that Mitsubishi would be the first major Japanese automaker to end production in both the U.S. and Europe. The company has built a plant in Thailand, bought one from Ford in the Philippines, and is building one in Indonesia.

Illinois state Sen. Bill Brady, whose district includes Normal, said he and other state officials were already working on a plan to find another manufacturer to buy the factory. "We are going to do everything we can to make sure people know that Mitsubishi no longer needs the facility, but that this is a facility that has a very efficient, world-class workforce and a supplier network that's second to none," he said. Brady also said he has talked to Mitsubishi officials have assured him that "Mitsubishi's effort to sell the plant will not be about getting top dollar for the sale but about doing the right thing.' The plant is the only Japaneseowned auto factory with UAW representation. The union contract at the plant expires this month. said DeVary. Both Brady and Normal Mavor Chris Koos stressed that Mitsubishi's decision was not about labor issues but because of dramatically falling sales. Brady said the hope now is that the closure

of the plant, which had been not been used to capacity as sales fell, "may bring the opportunity to more fully use the capacity of the plant and bring more jobs."

State and local officials would not identify specific companies they plan to recruit, but said they would not limit their outreach efforts to automakers.

"We're confident that we will be able to attract a replacement company in relatively short order," Koos said.

One industry analyst said factors such as the location of the plant and its proximity to a network of suppliers for the Detroit automobile industry could make it attractive to another automaker. But Karl Brauer, a senior analyst for Kelley Blue Book, also said that given Mitsubishi's the financial straits over the past decade, he doubts the company has invested much in technology to bring the plant up to date.

Still, "it is a foundation, a footprint, and there is already a process in place to ship cars from (the plant) and components to it," he said, adding that another company might do as electronic car maker Tesla Motors did a few years ago when it retooled a shuttered plant in Fremont, Calif.

"They had to basically start from scratch and now it is a very vibrant plant," he said.

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


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
