Dana Inc. Buys U.S. Manufacturing Site

in Warren might have noticed something new. Dana Incorporated has completed its \$100 million acquisition of the axle housing and driveline shaft manufacturing operations of U.S. Manufacturing Corporation (USM).

The historic 1.2 million sq. ft. facility on Van Dyke in Warren, was originally home to the Detroit Arsenal Tank Plant, which was built in 1940 as the first selfcontained facility dedicated solely to the production of American military tanks, said Dana spokesman Jeff Cole.

During World War II, the faciliwas a key manufacturing site for successive generations of armored vehicles through 1997.

The facility currently employs nearly 800 people, bringing Dana's presence in the greater Detroit region to 1,400 people at four facilities, Cole said.

Dana's new operation in Warren is located near a number of strategic customers and is about an hour from the Dana World Headquarters and Technology Center near Toledo, Ohio. This close proximity will provide the plant with rapid access to the company's technical expertise and advanced operating and quality systems.

The addition of the USM operations also:

• Strengthens the supply chain for several of Dana's most strategic customers and programs while transitioning significally integrated supply;

• Increases Dana's revenue from passenger and commercialvehicle manufacturers;

· Provides Dana with intellectual property and proprietary manufacturing processes that strengthen the company's existing portfolio of lightweighting innovations, which assist customers in achieving sustainabilitv and fuel-efficiency objectives;

· Secures capacity to accommodate existing program uplifts and expanded product applications in new market segments.

Based in Maumee, Ohio, its operations were selected as a 2017 "Top Workplace" in Northwest Ohio and Southeast Michigan by The (Toledo) Blade.

TARDEC, SAE Seek Support For New Combat Vehicle

The U.S. Army is looking for a few good companies interested in helping develop a new prototype for the Next Generation Combat Vehicle (NGVC).

On March 29, the Army's TARDEC command, which is based at the Detroit Arsenal in Warren, held a meeting on the campus of Macomb Community College. There officials outlined exactly what the Army was looking for in terms of partners and how the process of developing a new NGVC prototype would work.

The briefing was headed by David Porreca, who is executive director of the Defense Automotive Technologies Consortium (DATC).

The DATC, Porreca explained, is affiliated with the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE). The group is working with the Army's Detroit Arsenal Automotive (DA2) OTA to develop a new NGVC.

OTA means "Other Transaction Authority," said Thomas Vern, TARDEC chief of staff. OTAs first got their start in the late 1950s during the beginning of the Space Race with the Soviet Union. The government wanted a

procurement platform would allow technology to be developed faster so that NASA could catch up with Soviet space technology.

Thus OTAs were created. An OTA has the ability to streamline government processes in technology development. Basically private businesses don't have to jump through so many hoops to work with the government, Vern

As time went on, OTAs began to be applied to other government departments beyond NASA.

Duramax's Engine Reaches Two Million-Built Milestone

It's nice to be popular. General CWA Local 755 hourly and 114 Motors, DMAX, Ltd. and I.U.E.-CWA Local 755 employees on March 24 celebrated the build of the 2 millionth Duramax 6.6L V8 turbo-diesel engine.

Groundbreaking for the new DMAX, Ltd. plant in Moraine, Ohio, began in 1998, with the first engine rolling off the line July 17, 2000, said GM spokeswoman Mary Ann Brown.

Since then, Duramax engines have won multiple awards and built a reputation for impressive power and durability, Brown said. Today, DMAX makes the Duramax diesel engines for heavyduty Chevrolet Silverado and GMC Sierra pickup trucks. Duramax engines also power some Navistar commercial trucks, Gale Banks vehicles and even marine applications.

DMAX, Ltd. has grown its employment in the past few years and currently employs 554 I.U.E.-

The plant has received two recent investments:

• 2014: \$60 million investment announced for emissions improvements;

• 2015: \$82 million investment announced for productivity improvements.

Employees are currently building the redesigned Duramax 6.6L V8 turbo-diesel, Brown said. This next-generation engine offers more horsepower and torque than ever - an SAE-certified 445 horsepower at 2,800 rpm and 910 lb-ft of torque at 1,600 rpm – to enable easier, more confident hauling and trailering.

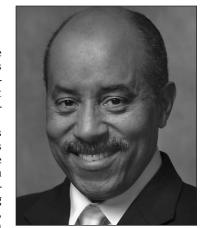

• Jack Roush – Jack Roush is an icon of American motorsports and a distinguished automotive entrepreneur. As a racing team owner, Roush has won championships in NHRA and IHRA Drag Racing, SCCA Trans Am, IMSA GT, and NASCAR stock car racing. In total, Roush's teams have won over 400 races across numerous disciplines of motorsports.

In addition to his racing successes, Roush oversees Roush Enterprises, which encompasses a freelance engineering firm, an aftermarket automotive supplier, and ROUSH Clean-Tech, a manufacturer of propane fuel systems.

TARDEC wants to develop the NGCV fairly quickly, Vern said, so it created an OTA called DATC for that process.

Porreca said when SAE learned that the government wanted to create an OTA to develop the NGCV, the organziation applied to be the group that administered the OTA from the civilian side of things. The government approved the SAE's application in September. It will work with DA2 to set the parameters and monitor the work.

The SAE has a long history of supporting the U.S. Army, and the Department of Defense," Porreca said. "The technology the Army depends on has come a long way since SAE designed the first Standardized truck - the Liberty Truck in WWI, exactly 100 years ago. But the mission remains the same – provide the military with the best technology available. SAE is excited about supporting the development of the NGCV through its recently organized Defense Automotive Technologies Consortium."

Porreca has been working with the SAE for the past several years as the director of Automotive Activities, and is a graduate of the West Point Military Academy. His degree was in engineering and after he left the Army, he worked in the heavy vehicle industry for many years. He also received his MBA from Augusta College in Georgia.

Since Septemeber, Porreca said, the DATC has been working to set up a consortium of companies that will work to create the

"The Army is looking to collaborate with a team comprised of innovative engineering organization from industry, academia and defense communities," Porreca said. "DATC anticipates a Request for White Paper (RWP) to be released to DATC members that is expected to result in a Project Award to a single team. DATC members will self-organize teams and identify a Lead Member to assemble and submit the team's proposal. The Lead Member will collaborate and coordinate with the team's subject matter experts

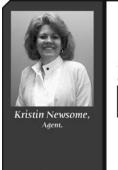

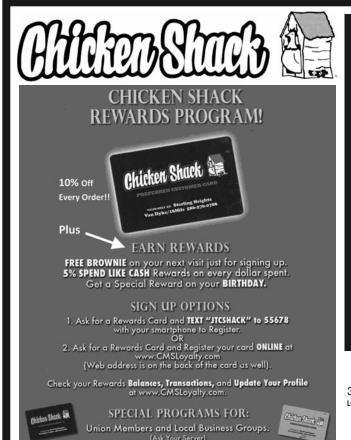

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Uber Crash in Arizona Raises Legal Issues

PHOENIX (AP) - A crash that caused an Uber self-driving SUV to flip onto its side in a Phoenix suburb serves as a stark reminder of the challenges surrounding autonomous vehicles in Arizona, a state that has gone all-in to entice the company by promising minimal government regulation.

The March 24 crash was blamed on the driver of an oncoming SUV that turned left in front of the Uber vehicle carrying two test drivers and no passengers. There were no serious iniuries and the driver of the other car was cited for a moving violation. But images of Uber's Volvo SUV rolled onto its side reverberated heavily on social media.

Uber responded by briefly suspending its self-driving cars in its three testing locations - Arizona, San Francisco and Pittsburgh as it investigated the accident.

Uber's self-driving car program is rolling out amid questions about how much government regulation it should endure on issues such as accidents, insurance and reporting instances in which the person behind the wheel in test cars needs to take control of the vehicle.

The San Francisco startup endured a shaky December rollout in California, including running red lights, that culminated in a standoff between Uber and state regulators who wanted more transparency and reporting.

Arizona Gov. Doug Ducey seized the opportunity and used lax regulations to entice Uber, which decided to ship more than a dozen SUVs to metro Phoenix.

"California may not want you, but Arizona does," said Ducey, who took the first ride as a passenger in Uber's self-driving cars last month.

Uber spokeswoman Taylor Patterson said the company is operating more than a dozen of the 21 vehicles it has registered in Arizona. Some pick up passengers.

In Arizona, companies such as Uber only need to carry minimum liability insurance policies to operate self-driving cars. They are not required to track crashes like the one that occurred in Tempe on March 24 or report any information to the state.

That means that self-driving test cars are essentially treated like all other cars on the road.

Ducey spokesman Daniel Scarpinato said in a March 3 interview that the cars are safe and there is sufficient oversight under existing automobile rules.

"There's a driver in the car," he said. "The state oversight is: There are not cars without drivers in them.'

John Simpson of the Californiabased advocacy group Consumer Watchdog said Ducey has abandoned his responsibility to protect the public by buying into the hype surrounding Uber.

"It's a fundamental responsibility of a governor of a state to make sure that when companies are using the state's public highways as their own private laboratories, that there is some obligation to protect public safety,' Simpson said. "There are no rules in Arizona."

In March, Uber obtained permits for two of its Volvo SUVS to again hit the streets in San Francisco.

California's rules for autonomous vehicles require a \$5 million insurance policy, and the companies must reports accidents to the state within 10 days and release an annual tally documenting how many times test drivers had to take over.

Also, unlike in Arizona and Pennsylvania, passengers are not allowed to ride in autonomous vehicles in California.

Ducey doesn't believe self-driving car testing needs extra regulations because drivers can take over if something goes wrong, but his office said Monday after the accident that "public safety remains our top priority and we will continue to monitor the situation closely.'

Kevin Biesty, deputy director for policy for the Arizona Department of Transportation, said the state could set up a system to monitor local police accident reports involving self-driving cars but chose not to do so.

"At this point we don't see an issue if the vehicles are being operated safely - they'll be responsible for whatever issues arise. just like any driver," Biesty said.

Uber's SUVs have been tooling around Phoenix and Tempe for more than three months, and police in both cities said they knew of no accidents before March 24.

Other companies testing selfdriving cars in Arizona include Waymo, a Google spinoff company, and General Motors. Intel has a fleet of self-driving cars that are being tested, although they are not used in autonomous mode on city streets, company spokeswoman Danielle Mann said.

There's no Arizona state data showing how many accidents the cars may have been involved in or caused.

Police in suburban Chandler said the Google cars have been in at least four wrecks in the past three years.

None of the GM cars have been involved in accidents, said Kevin Kelly, the company's spokesman for advanced technology proj-

Uber's recent crash comes amid a series of public-relations woes at the company, including an upheaval of its executive ranks and allegations that it routinely ignores sexual harassment.

and smoother, for greater refinement, Brown said. It is also capable of running on B20 biodiesel, a fuel composed of 20 percent biodiesel and 80 percent conventional diesel. B20 helps lower carbon dioxide emissions and lessen dependence on petroleum. It is a domestically produced, renewable fuel made primarily of plant matter, mostly soybean oil.

Volkswagen to **Settle Lawsuits**

DETROIT (AP) - Volkswagen is paying more than \$157 million to 10 states to settle environmental lawsuits over the company's diesel emissions scandal.

The company says the money will go to Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Massachusetts, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont and Washington. All 10 states follow California's clean air standards.

The settlement covers 3-Liter six-cylinder diesel engines and is separate from a \$603 million agreement reached last year with 44 states, Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico that covered 2liter engines.

Volkswagen has admitted to programming its diesel engines to activate pollution controls during government treadmill tests and turning them off for roadway driving.



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
